# Transitions in Immigration Status Team

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What is secondary data analysis?

*Applying a new research question to data collected for another purpose*

Why do secondary data analysis??

## Advantages of secondary data analysis

- *Saves time and resources*
- *Making full use of existing data*
- *Fewer demands on partners*
- *Avoids over-soliciting hard-to-reach populations*

## Disdvantages of secondary data analysis

- *May not fully address your question*
- *Can be hard to understand the context of the study*
- *Ethical concerns*

- *Original projects focused on:*
  - *Migrant caregivers*
  - *Im/migrant temp agency workers*
  - *Pregnant precarious status migrants*
  - *Temporary Foreign Workers*
  - *North African im/migrants*

All with rich information on  
immigration status

- Frustration after years of documenting difficulties with status
- Concerns about over-soliciting partners
- Desire to share and compare our results

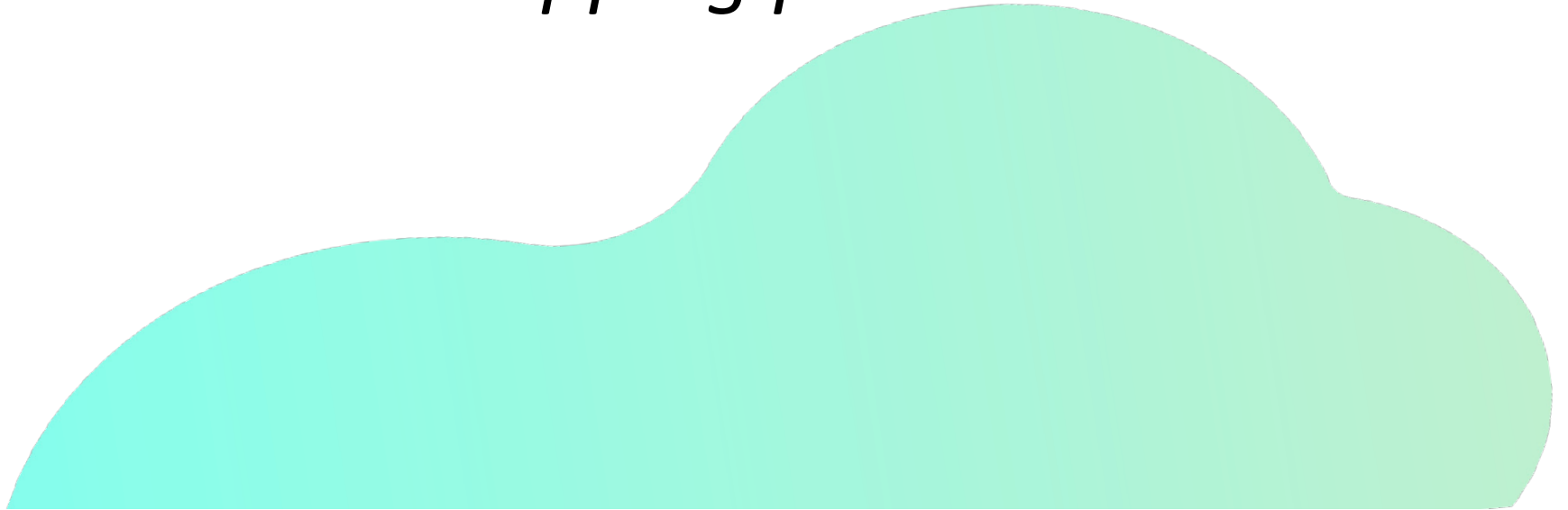


## OBJECTIVE:

*Identify the « tipping points » in immigration status trajectories in order to inform policy and practice (casework & organizing)*

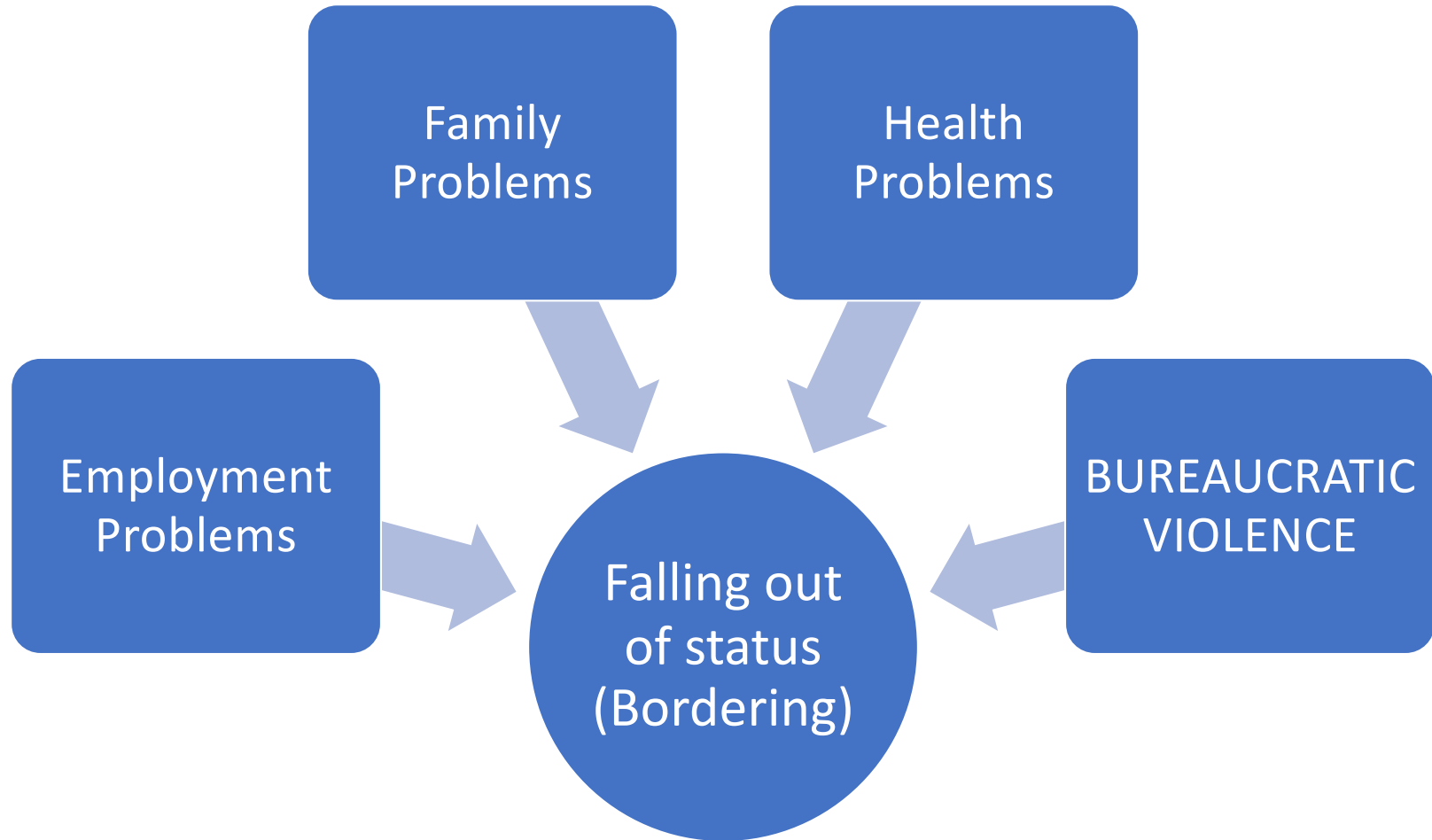


*Why is it important for us to understand  
these tipping points?*



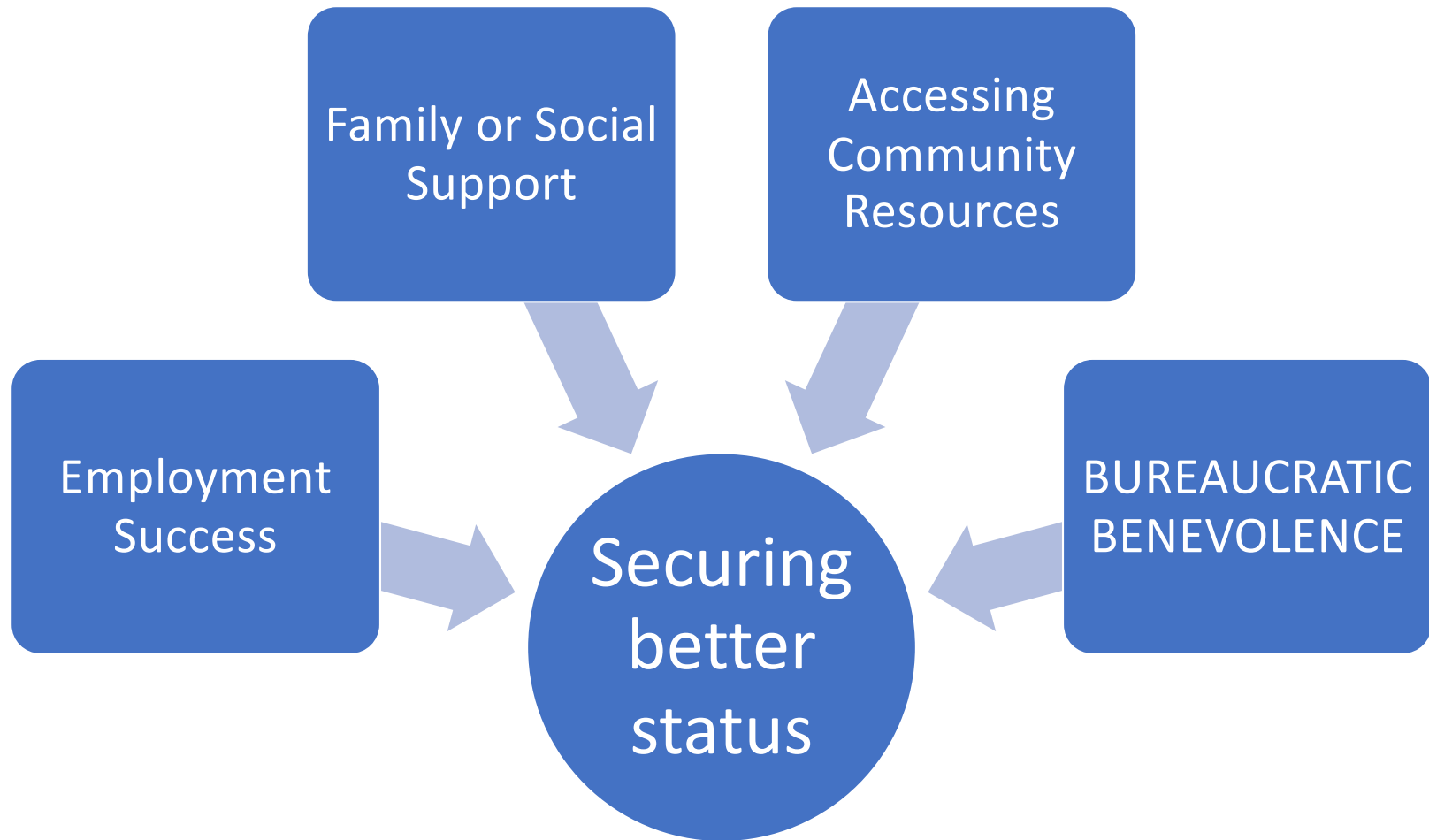
*What are the tipping points for  
falling out of status?*

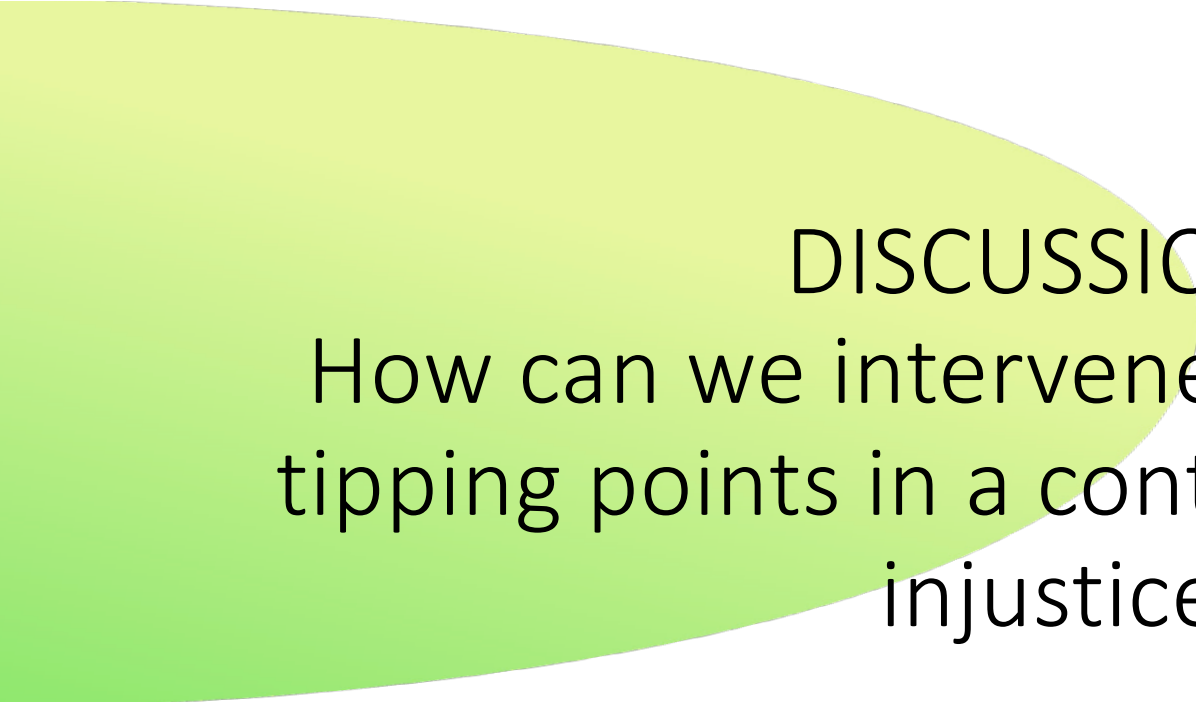




*What are the tipping points for
